Raymond C. Mulcahy, 60, of Wilmington, California, passed away unexpectedly on January 22, 2021. He passed away peacefully with his wife and two daughters surrounding him.

During his time with Union 2375, he mentored and trained many young adults, while serving his union as the President of Local 2375, twice elected. He adored being outdoors, always inclined for adventure, a true love for animals, his community, and most of all, his family. Ray's most favorite question to ask was, "Are you a leader or a follower?" and there really was only one correct answer. That is how he lived his life, with leadership and the willpower to overcome any obstacle he faced.

One of Raymond's biggest accomplishments in life was being a husband and a father. He had always wanted children and considered himself the luckiest man alive to have two daughters. His children, Ashley and Allyson, always relied on him for advice, humor, and to help them through all of life's ups and downs. Ray taught them how to truly love life, be compassionate always to others, and love unconditionally through every moment of life.

Raymond is survived by his wife, Amira Mulcahy, his oldest daughter, Ashley Mulcahy Toney and husband Shawn Toney, and his youngest daughter, Allyson Mulcahy.

“ Ray Mulcahy was many things to many people. He was a very proud husband, father, brother and son to a successful family. Ray told me many, many times about their accomplishments and dedicated much of his heart to the cause. Ray loved racing and, along with his brother, Charlie, put many hours under the hood pushing the limit of engines.

I know Ray primarily from Piledrivers Local 2375. Ray's father, Pat, and my father, Bob, served on the Executive Board together nearly fifty years ago, and our families would visit and dine with each other when I was very young. But for the last thirty plus years, Ray and I were union members together. For six years, we served on the Executive Board together - Ray as President and I as Recording Secretary. Before he retired, Ray told me about his medical condition and his plans for the future. There were certain things that Ray wanted to be noted about his service:

1. Except for when he worked out of town, Ray never missed a meeting. It was a lesson he learned from his parents and proof of his dedication to working people.
2. It was at Ray's request that a Local 2375 newsletter be established. The "Hook and Nail" was in existence for nearly twenty years. The newsletter was a critical communication to Pile Drivers not only from Local 2375, but union pile drivers throughout the country and Canada.
3. By vote of the membership, Ray was the Local's nominee for the Harry Bridges Institute's Working Class Hero and was honored at the Institute's dinner.

Ray was a dedicated friend to those he believed in, and a dedicated foe to those he didn't. Most of us knew which side we were on, sooner or later. It was much better to be on the right side of Ray's ledger. I have many more memories about our successful collaborations - picnics, Labor Day parades, political rallies, general conventions, Pile Driver conferences, and delegate meetings. There are too many to cite here, especially now that Local 2375 no longer exists.

On behalf of the Schafer family, our condolences go out to his family and loved ones; may his memory be a blessing. Ray's footprint on life will definitely go far and leave plenty of treadmarks.
